The February program: "Corvids—The Amazing Crow Family" was presented by Scott Kiester, Flower Mound, TX.

A certified Texas Master Naturalist since 2003, Scott is a lifelong birder and student of nature. He has worked on conservation-related projects with different conservation groups throughout north Texas. He is currently active in the Elm Fork Chapter of the Texas Master Naturalists, leading monthly bird walks at the Clear Creek Natural Heritage Center near Denton and at Lake Ray Roberts State Park, and is engaged in various volunteer projects at LLELA. Scott is a retired geologist and has an M.S. in environmental science.

He previously presented this program in October 2020 at the annual meeting of Texas Master Naturalists.

New date: Saturday, 27 February – Heading to CBFS in Huntsville!

Destination: Sam Houston State University's **Center for Biological Field Studies**Situated in Walker County, adjacent to Sam Houston National Forest, the CBFS is a biological field station owned and operated by Sam Houston State University, and not normally open to the public. It covers 100 hectares (274 acres) and is bisected by Harmon Creek. As an eBird hotspot, CBFS has so far recorded 78 bird species; https://ebird.org/hotspot/L8668963

Cool Local Birds! Over the last month...

Harris County:

Hooded Oriole in Seabrook; Black-headed Grosbeak, Bullock's Oriole, Western Tanagers at private feeders; Painted Redstart still in Briarforest area, off Dairy-Ashford; Red-naped Sapsucker still off E NASA Pkwy in Taylor Lake Village Community Park; Lark Bunting and Ladder-backed Woodpecker on Warren Ranch; and Pine Siskins seemingly everywhere.

Montgomery County:

Red Crossbills and **Purple Finches** on Kelly's Pond Road off 204, south of 1375 in Sam Houston National Forest, near the Walker County line.

Fort Bend County:

Greater Scaup and **Lapland Longspur** at Cross Creek Ranch Wetlands; **Anna's Hummingbird** and **Broad-tailed Humminbird** at private feeders; and Purple Finches abound.

Galveston County:

Pyrrhuloxia on Artist Boat property- Spanish Grant subdivision off Stewart Rd; **Least Bittern** and **Fox Sparrow** at High Island-Smith Oaks

Brazoria County:

Black-headed Grosbeak in Pearland; Bullock's Oriole, Baltimore Oriole, Yellow-throated Warbler, Summer Tanager at private feeders; plus Purple Finches.

February Trivia Q answer: 4BBRW beats E7

On Sept 16, 2020 a male **Bar-tailed Godwit**, fitted with a 5gm satellite transmitter, left southwest Alaska and flew non-stop across the Pacific Ocean in 11 days, arriving on the mudflats at Miranda, east of Auckland, a journey of more than 7500 miles. The record-breaking, fearless flyer is known as "4BBRW" (after the blue, red and white rings attached to its legs).

The previous record for a non-stop flight was 7250 miles, set by a Bar-tailed Godwit known as E7, in 2007.
