Program: Texas Bird Records with Dr. Keith Arnold

Now that we are all capable of obtaining photos of the rare birds we see, it is time for a program on the Texas Bird Records Committee. Dr Keith Arnold will share with us the committee's history and workings with some recent records included as examples. Since Dr Arnold also compiles the Texas Christmas Bird Counts, he will encourage us to submit details for those as well as the TBRC.

Dr Arnold received his Ph.D. from L.S.U. He joined the faculty of the Department of Wildlife Science (now Wildlife and Fisheries Sciences) of Texas A&M University in 1966. He retired as Professor in August 2005, after 39 years, but remains on as a "visiting professor" to teach for this academic year. He also remains as Curator of Birds of the Texas Cooperative Wildlife Collections. Both his bachelor's and master's degrees are from universities in Michigan. Beverly, his wife of 38 years, will join us for the evening.

Minutes of the November 7, 2005 Meeting

Bayland Community Center Attendance: 46

- 1. Learning Corner: Glenn Olsen's presentation "Tips for Identifying Female Ducks on the Upper Texas Coast" was very informative and included helpful handouts. Of 31 species recorded in Texas, 23 species are abundant, and 8 species rare. Glenn stressed learning the habitat, the behavior, and size of the ducks.
- 2. Chairman Michael Williams opened the meeting at 7:10 with *bird sightings*. Nelson's Sharp-tailed Sparrow at Bolivar Flats was a big hit; many Vermilion Flycatchers at Brazos Bend; Goldencrowned Kinglets in Houston area; Brown Creepers; Winter Wrens; Horned Larks: Scarlet Tanager; Great Kiskadee; Whimbrel; Merlin. The Almoneys possibly saw a first record bird in Peru, a Redgartered Coot.
- 3. Michael welcomed the many *newcomers* to the meeting.
- **4.** *Minutes* of the last meeting were accepted after a correction to thank Patsy Lawrence for her delicious fun popcorn balls.
- 5. Library: no news.
- **6.** Newsletter: Al Shultz noted the submission deadline for the *Spoonbill* is at the end of this week. He also spoke of options to reduce the cost of the newsletter. He and Margret Simmons are working on this. Margret said receiving the *Spoonbill* via e-mail was a guarantee of receiving it on time, as many members fail to get their copy until way after the meeting. Anyone wishing to receive the *Spoonbill* by email, please let Al know.

- 7. Environmental Issues: Mary Dodson spoke on the Endangered Species Act, and how we all need to let our congressmen know that we do not want this act to be wiped out. Congress is also trying to open the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge to drilling.
- 8. Field Trips: The day trip to J.H. Jones State Park and W.G. Jones State Forest was a big success. Two Red-cockaded Woodpeckers were seen as well as many other birds. Upcoming Katy Prairie trip on Nov. 19 will be a full day starting at 6 a.m. for the owl prowl and 8 a.m. for those wishing a later start. Bill Saulmon reported the midweek trip on the 12th of October to the Arboretum was not very successful, however, there were 10 participants. Skip Almoney is leading next midweek trip on Nov. 9 to Cullinan Park in Sugarland. (Skip made two other announcements: 1.We sponsor the Feather Fest in Galveston (Mar.31-Apr. 1, 2006) and need liaisons for the trips; 2.Bobby Ray Harrison will speak on "The Ivory-billed Woodpecker" in Galveston at the Rosenberg Library on Nov. 16; call for reservations.) Adam said the quarterly trip in Jan. to the Valley has been opened to 15 members. The cost will be \$25 dollars for trip and \$10 to the club. David Sarkozi was to have spoken about the Christmas Bird Counts; TOS has all the listings on their website. Glenn Olsen is starting a year long bird survey on Buffalo Bayou and needs help; contact him by e-mail. Kathy Farr asked for volunteers to sign for helping with the TOS conference in Jan. 2006. Bill Godley announced a bird hike this Saturday at 8 a.m. at Brazos Bend State Park, starting at 40 Acre Lake.

- 10. Program: This evening we were treated not only to a delightfully enthusiastic expert birder but also to a very knowledgeable wildlife photographer. Bernice Hotman introduced Clay Taylor of Connecticut who is the Naturalist Market Manager for Swarovski Optik. The program "Digi-What?" covered the history of digiscoping and its practical applications for birders and nature watchers, and discussed the different combinations of digital cameras and spotting scopes that can be used. Along with his presentation, Clay showed slides of wildlife, emphasizing the different settings one could adjust to improve pictures. There were many questions from interested members. Clay led the Bolivar Flats trip on Sun. Nov. 6, showing all participants the actual uses of cameras and scopes. Thank you, Clay, for a most informative evening.

December Field Trips

Houston Christmas Bird Count, December 17: The holiday season is upon us once again and it is time for another fun and exciting round of Christmas Bird Counts. The December O.G. field trip will be the annual Houston Christmas Bird Count, which will be held on the 17th of December. The count circle includes Baytown and La Porte on the eastern side of the metro area, and is divided into areas to coordinate people and reporting. I strongly encourage all of you to participate in the Christmas Bird Count even if it is only watching your feeder in your back yard. This is a chance for all of us to practice citizen science by contributing information to the scientific community that will help in tracking population changes in bird species. The information gathered during the counts will help determine how bird species populations are doing from year to year, and can show if any bird species populations are declining significantly. The more eyes we have out there, the less chance for a bird to go by unnoticed. I further suggest that everybody will try to participate in other Christmas Bird Counts besides Houston's. Mid-Week Field Trip: The December 2005 midweek birding trip will be on Wednesday, December 14, 2005 at the Timbergrove (11th Street) Park. The leader for this trip will be Skip Almoney; he will be at the designated meeting point at 8:00 a.m. and the trip will not last beyond 12 noon. We will be birding a small urban park that has 5 woodpecker species listed on its checklist. This trip will help to find base data for the bird life in this green space that is in danger of being developed.* We may also walk to the White Oak Bayou and bird the green space surrounding it. The meeting place will be southeast corner of Timbergrove Park. There is only side-street parking here. The park is located at the corner of 11th Street and Shelterwood Street in the Heights area. To reach this location, get on West T. C. Jester from either I-10 (go north on TC Jester) or from I-610 North Loop (go south on T. C. Jester). Go to the intersection of West T C Jester and 11th Street, and go west from that intersection. After crossing White Oak Bayou, the second street is Shelterwood Drive. Turn north on Shelterwood and park along the street, or on one of the side streets, Woodbrook or Pineshade Lanes. *–Skip Almoney*

Report on November Midweek Trip: On a warm and sunny November 9, 2005, the OG Field Trip to Cullinan Park yielded about 30 bird species and a variety of non-bird species. In addition to an expected Red-eared Slider, we saw a Nutria, a garter snake close up, and a beautiful, long grasshopper with large brown wings, yellowish legs and a yellow stripe down its neck and back. Most interesting was a coyote who plunged into the lake after a Little Blue Heron.

The birds provided some surprises also. There was a Red-shouldered Hawk working the southern portion of the pond, giving us some terrific looks from a distance of less than 30 feet. There were numerous ducks on the pond, including Gadwall, Northern Shoveler and Blue-winged Teal. The most exciting ducks were about 18 Wood Ducks swimming out in the open, giving good views the whole time we were there. The Anhingas gave us some good looks also. The wooded areas provided some additional species, including Carolina Chickadees, Blue-gray Gnatcatcher, doves, Ruby-crowned Kinglets, Northern Cardinals, several unidentified warbler/vireo species and a probable Orchard Oriole. —*Skip Almoney*

October Field Trip Report: Fourteen participants enjoyed a nice fall day of birding that began at 8:30 at Jesse H. Jones Park. We walked the Cypress Boardwalk Trail and eventually wound our way back to Spring Creek where a Bald Eagle had been reported a week earlier. Unfortunately we were not able to relocate the eagle, but all participants were treated to good looks at Yellow-bellied Sapsuckers, Pileated Woodpeckers, Red-bellied Woodpeckers, Downy Woodpeckers, Eastern Phoebes, Ruby-crowned Kinglets, Belted Kingfisher, and a Brown Thrasher to name a few. We enjoyed a picnic lunch at Jones State Forest around the Mid Lakes Recreation Area. After the picnic lunch we drove over to the Sweetleaf Nature Trail to begin in earnest our search for the Red-cockaded Woodpecker. After fanning out near one of the colonies and waiting for about 15-20 minutes we were rewarded when a Red-cockaded Woodpecker graced us with its presence. About 10 minutes later a second one was spotted and all participants got good views. The only miss for the trip was the Brown-headed Nuthatch. Weather was very agreeable and a good time was had by all participants. For the trip we totaled about 40 bird species. --Adam Wood
