Program with Martin Hagne: Bird Specialties and Rarities of the Valley

The Lower Rio Grande Valley is one of the most, if not the most, diverse natural areas in the United States. The many bio-regions create habitats that allow a vast array of wildlife to prosper. The variety of avian life in the Valley is higher than in all but two complete states. Tonight we will briefly explore the reasons why such avian diversity exists in these four counties, and then delve into the rich beauty of the specialty birds and rarities of the area.

Martin Hagne was born and raised on the Swedish west coast. His grandfather instilled in him a love for nature at an early age as they spent their summer days fishing along the islands. Coastal birds were numerous, along with seals, foxes and other wildlife. Martin moved to the United States and the Rio Grande Valley of Texas in 1979. His wildlife interests were great, initially focusing on hunting trips, but not much was ever harvested. He found the Valley's native landscape unique and quite beautiful, and slowly turned that focus towards wildlife viewing and conservation concerns.

Martin has been an active birder for many years, but "birding" did not become a serious love until the winter of 1994. Spotting an Aplomado Falcon and a Golden Eagle at different times during that winter in Willacy County sealed his fate as an avid birder. He is currently serving as the Executive Director of the Valley Nature Center in Weslaco, Texas, where he has been working for the past five years. He compiles two Christmas Birds Counts, and leads birding and nature field trips.

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Minutes of the December 5, 2005 Meeting

Bayland Community Center Attendance: 60

- 1. *Learning Corner:* David Bradford spoke on "Sparrows of West Harris County." These sparrows winter in this area so there is no singing. However, the Savannah, Vesper, Song, Lincoln's, Harris's, Swamp, White-throated, White-crowned, and Field Sparrows all respond to pishing. Identification is difficult, but knowing habitat, facial markings, behavior, size, stripes, and color is most helpful.
- 2.Chairman Michael Williams opened the meeting at 7:10pm with *bird sightings:* Brown-headed Nuthatches, Henslow's Sparrows, Rusty Blackbirds were seen. A small OG group saw Eared Trogon, Rufous-backed Wood Rail, and 208 other species in western Mexico, and a Yellow Warbler was seen in the Galapagos. Two Rufous Hummers are wintering in Richmond. A Whooping Crane is in the Valley with Sandhill Cranes. Le Conte's Sparrows are at Addicks Dam, and Woodcocks are on Clay Road and in Little Thicket. Timbergrove Park will be retained as a park by city of Houston. Michael reminded everyone of the coming Christmas Bird Counts and distributed a list of all counts in the local area.
- 3. *Minutes* of November meeting were approved.
- 4. *Membership:* Margret stated that dues are now due. *The Spoonbill* is now online on the OG website.
- 5. Newsletter information is due on December 10.

- 6. Mary Dodson handed out *Conservation Corner* notes. With our State Parks being in danger of disappearing we need to contact our representatives to let them know how we think. The Endangered Species Act is again being modified to downgrade its protection; this must be addressed immediately.
- 7. *Field Trips:* Adam stated the Katy Prairie trip turned out great after finding lost participants! 80 species were seen and nice weather prevailed. There is now a message board on the OG website about field trips and bird sightings. Pictures of previous trips are also on the website. The Valley trip in January is filled, but Adam wants to find a second leader so that those on the waiting list can go. Mid-week trip will be to Timbergrove Park with Skip; directions are in *The Spoonbill*. Kathy reminded everyone to send in their registration for the TOS meeting in January. You may register online. There is no monthly trip in December; all are encouraged to find one or more Christmas Counts to attend. A shorebird survey of the entire Texas coast will be held January 21. FeatherFest in March-April still needs a liaison.
- 8. *Treasury:* We are OK.
- 9. *Program:* Bernice Hotman welcomed and introduced two guests this evening: Dr. Daniel Brooks of the Houston Museum of Natural Science, and Jeffrey Brown of Corpus Christi Museum of Science. Both were here to listen to our guest speaker, Dr. Keith Arnold, presently a visiting professor at Texas A&M University and a member of the Texas Bird Records Committee. His informal talk this evening was on the committee's history and workings with some recent records involved. The committee was started in 1972 at the request of the TOS. He emphasized that pictures or at least song recordings are needed in helping to identify rare birds. We should submit our findings even if others are doing so. Rejections of submissions should not be viewed with dismay. His photos were the highlight of his presentation as all tried to identify the birds. There are between 50-75 records of rare birds in Texas.
- 10. Refreshments were provided by Wanda Smith.

Midweek Birding Trip with Skip Almoney: January 11 at Sims Bayou

The January 2006 midweek birding trip will be on January 11, 2006, at Sims Bayou Urban Nature Center. This property has recently been acquired by the Houston Audubon Society and is now their Educational and Outreach Center. It is a peaceful, miniature farm only two blocks from I-45 and has the potential for some great birding. The leader for this trip will be Skip Almoney. He will be at the designated meeting point at 8:00 a.m. and the trip will not last beyond 12 noon. Our birding will include the gardens and small yard area, the wooded banks of a Sims Bayou tributary, and along the water from the dock. We can expect to see most resident songbirds, probably woodpeckers and if we are lucky maybe some Wood Ducks. To reach HAS's Sims Bayou Urban Nature Center take I-45 South from downtown Houston,

Exit 38B-Howard/Bellfort. Go left under the freeway, take the feeder northbound (left), turn right on River Drive and follow the winding drive for about ½ mile. The nature Center will be on your right. There is small parking lot in front of the center, but you may have to park on one of the adjoining streets.

Katy Prairie Field Trip Report

Steve Gross led 25 participants for a great day of birding on the Katy Prairie on November 19, 2005. Temperature was cool but not too cold and there was no wind -- perfect birding conditions although skies were overcast. We started at 6:00 a.m. to try and pick up some owls before first light. All we managed was a semi-decent look at one Short-eared Owl. After first light we were treated to a huge flock of Snow Geese (with Ross's Geese mixed in) that almost stretched from one horizon to the other and was three layers deep. We estimated that there were about 50,000 geese in all, with about a 50/50 split of white and blue phase. We found it to be a rather high percentage of blue phase Snow Geese. Other highlights included: Barred Owl, Barn Owl, Darkeyed Junco, a lingering Dickcissel, four Harris's Sparrows, Krider's Red-tailed Hawk, Bald Eagle, and a Vermillion Flycatcher. We wrapped the day up at 6 p.m. back at the Short-eared Owl spot, hoping for a better look than we got in the morning. We totaled about 81 bird species for the day. I want to thank everybody who came out on this field trip. I was surprised by the number of people who attended this trip and hope to see similar numbers on future trips.

Because of slow mail delivery, some people do not receive their Spoonbill in a timely fashion and may elect to discontinue their mailed copy of *The Spoonbill*. Or you may just want to help OG save money to allow us to pursue other projects. Whatever the reason, anyone can choose the new \$10 rate if you are willing to forgo the printed *Spoonbill*.

If you haven't already renewed your ONC-OG membership for 2006, please pay at the next OG meeting, or mail your check with the membership form on the back of the Spoonbill. We look forward to another great birding year!

Fifty Years Ago



October 23 Field Trip to Cypress Hockley Area (Noel Perley)

Perfect weather and a late starting time (11:00 a.m.) were undoubtedly responsible for the big turn-out for this trip - 30 persons in 12 cars. Our leader, Miss Carrie Holcomb, and her party (Leota Stilwell, and David and Carol Watson) were somewhat delayed while en route to our starting point (Hockley) but for good reason, viz. two Western kingbirds! The two birds were seen along Westheimer Road (near Rogers Road) northeast of Alief, and turned out to be the day's most unusual sightings.

We headed back to Hockley at about 2:15 p.m and thence southward via Katy-Hockley Road over Cypress Creek: and then east to the Longenbaugh Ranch. At this point, Mrs. H. J. Longenbaugh and company (Mrs. F. N. Evans and Mrs. John A. Kitzmann) took over as hosts and guides. We proceeded along a dirt road which skirted a dike for as long as our curiosity would permit and then we stopped the cars and scrambled up the levee to "see what was on the other side". We weren't disappointed by what we beheld -- ducks, geese and shorebirds by the thousands. Pintails filled the sky and all four kinds of geese greeted us with their "call-of-the-wild" honking. Baldpates, Mallards, shovelers, fulvous tree ducks and both teals were identified, along with avocets and one American bittern.

In Memoriam ...

Probably the oldest living member of the OG died on Sept. 27, 2005, in California, at age 98 yrs, 11 months: Louise Hoffman.

Jean and I, as novice birders, met Louise, and her husband Henry Hoffman, on our first Spring Count, in April, 1960. I don't know how long they had been birding prior to that time. Yes, back in the 'old days' we had 'Spring Counts,' during migration, in the same count-circle that we did the Christmas Counts! Louise and Henry were active members of the OG until they moved to California, about the mid 1970's, where they continued birding. Henry, who was OG Chairman in the '60s, died some years ago. We had the opportunity and good fortune to visit Louise two years ago in Lemon Grove, California. At 97, she was living alone in a retirement village, and was bright, lucid, active, cheerful, lots of fun......and still looking at birds around her cottage!

We can think of only a few 'old-timers' left who would remember Louise, but we thought this information might be of interest to the group.
