Four Decades of Texas Ornithology
Dr. Keith Arnold, Texas A&M University

Dr. Keith Arnold earned his Ph.D. from Louisiana State University, and since 1966 has taught ornithology, including field ornithology, to more than 2,500 students in Texas A&M's Department of Wildlife and Fisheries Sciences, where he is Professor Emeritus. He is the originator of the Texas Bird Records Committee, served as its chairman for nearly 20 years, and remains its official academician. His research has taken him to countries as distant as Tanzania, as well as Mexico. Costa Rica, and Dominica. He has more than 70 scientific publications to his name, as well as a field guide, Birds of Texas. In addition, he is curator of birds for the Texas Cooperative Wildlife Collections, a fellow of the American Ornithologists' Union, and an honorary life member and former president of the Texas Ornithological Society. For the past 20 years, he has also provided private consulting on endangered species including the Black-capped Vireo and Golden-cheeked

Please join us as Dr. Arnold shares his 40 years of study and observation of birds in Texas.

Minutes of Meeting on Monday, May 4, 2009 Number of Attendees: 65

- 1. Learning Corner: Steve Gross discussed the birds of summer. Some of the birds that can be seen in the summer on the Katy Prairie are Dickcissel, Scissor-tailed Flycatcher, Common Nighthawk, and Fulvous Whistling Duck. The Piney Woods is a good place to see Prothonotary Warbler, Yellow-throated Warbler, Northern Parula, and Hooded Warbler. Brazos Bend State Park is a good place to see Painted Bunting. A visit to the shore will often give you a view of the Sanderling in beautiful breeding plumage; Wilson's and Piping Plovers; most of the terns (except Common Tern); Frigatebirds, and Skimmers. This is also the season to enjoy the Chimney Swifts, Barn Swallows, Purple Martins, and Mississippi and Swallow-tailed Kites.
- Sightings: Bernice Hotman opened the meeting and the following sightings were mentioned: Black-whiskered Vireo, Bobolink, Golden-winged Warbler, Common Yellowthroat, Purple Gallinule at an apartment pool, Hudsonian Godwit and Wilson's Phalarope at Paul Rushing Park. Some interesting yard birds were Rosebreasted Grosbeak, Summer Tanager, Indigo Bunting, Baltimore Oriole, Orchard Oriole, Bay-breasted Warbler, and Magnolia Warbler.
- 3. **Minutes of Previous Meeting**: Minutes from the April 6 meeting were approved as printed in the previous *Spoonbill*.
- 4. **Treasurer's Report**: Jerry Stanislav presented a Treasurer's Report and Budget for the fiscal years ending 5/31/09 and 5/31/10. There were no questions or comments. The budget was approved unanimously.
- 5. **Donation:** The Executive Committee recommended a donation of \$500 to the Katy Prairie Conservancy. This was unanimously approved by the membership.
- 6. **Library Report**: DebbieValdez encouraged members to check out CD's and books for the summer.
- 7. **Spoonbill**: The next issue will be August 2009. The deadline for submissions is July 15.
- 8. **Field Trips:** Adam Wood reported that the week-long trip to the Davis and Guadalupe Mountains was a great success with 205 species seen. Some highlights were Lesser Prairie-Chicken, Gray Vireo, Black-capped Vireo, Grace's Warbler, Virginia's Warbler, Common Black-hawk, and 8 Burrowing Owls in one location. The highlight of the April trip to the Gulf Coast Bird Observatory was watching the bird banding.
- 9. **Future Field Trips:** Details of the May 16 trip to the Trinity River are on the website. Target birds will be lingering migrants. The May 30 kayaking trip on Christmas Bay is a joint trip with Houston Audubon.
- 10. **Program:** Pam Smolen introduced Keith Barnes, cofounder of Tropical Birds. Keith spoke about Madagascar, the fourth-largest island in the world, and showed slides of its birds and other wildlife. Although the island is not much bigger than Texas, it has 5 vegetation zones. There are 258 species of birds, 120 which are endemic. Madagascar has an amazing diversity of wildlife, with 60 species of chameleon and 30 species of lemur. The animals are not afraid of humans, and it is possible to get very close to them. The Spiny Desert is

Monthly Field Trip: Quintana Area and Bryan Beach

August 15, 2009 -- Quintana Jetty -- 8 a.m.

Our first monthly field trip of the new OG year is to the Quintana area and Bryan Beach. I will lead us to all the various hotspots (Quintana Jetty, Quintana Neararctic/Neotropical Migratory Bird Sanctuary and Bryan Beach) in the Quintana area, as well as a few other spots that are not as well known, in search of various migrant shorebirds as well as any early migrant warblers or other passerines. The main goal for the trip will be the shorebirds that should be around in fairly large numbers, since August is the prime month for shorebird migration. Special emphasis will be placed on finding as many species of sandpipers as we can, with extra time being spent on ID'ing Dowitchers, the small peeps (Least, Western and Semipalmated Sandpipers), Baird's and White-rumped Sandpiper. We could encounter Surf Scoter, Greater Scaup, Horned Grebe, Northern Gannet, and Lesser Black-backed Gull (becoming regular nowadays). The potential exists for finding an odd gull because this is one of the few areas where odd gulls have a habitat of turning up along the Upper Texas Coast (UTC). It is still very hot in this region during this time so the trip will probably last only until lunch, but if the weather is unseasonably nice and we are finding good birds we may continue birding after lunch for those who are interested. So come out and enjoy a nice morning of shorebirding along the UTC.

Meet at the parking lot for Quintana Jetty at 8:00 a.m. on Saturday, August 15, 2009. To get there from Houston, take SH 288 south to BUS 288 and head towards Angleton. Take a left at the third light, which is FM 523, and continue to FM 1495. At FM 1495 turn left and head south across the Intracoastal Waterway to CR 723, then turn left (east) and drive until CR 723 dead ends into 5th street. Go right on 5th street to Burnet St. (the very next street) and go left (east) on Burnet Street to 2nd Street. Turn right (south) on 2nd St. and follow it to the sandy parking area for the Quintana Jetty.

Make sure to bring binoculars, a hat, sunscreen, raingear (in case it rains, but we will bird rain or shine), water, snacks if you would like, a scope (if you have one) and camera. If you plan to bird in the afternoon, make sure to bring a lunch.

2009 Swift Awareness Events

August 5: Chimney Swifts with Pam Smolen

7:00 - 8:30 p.m. at the Nature Discovery Center

Chimney Swifts chatter over Houston from March to October every year consuming massive amounts of mosquitoes and other bugs. Chimney Swifts build their nests, raise their families, and sleep just feet from where we live. During this presentation we will explore the fascinating and secretive home life of these aerial acrobats and what Houston birders are doing to conserve their declining numbers.

August 27: Swift Night Out in Dayton

Meet at 7:00 p.m. at the Rice Dryer in Dayton for special activities associated with the weekly count.

September 1: Swift Night Out at Whole Foods Market

Activities will begin at 7:00 p.m. at the Whole Foods Market parking lot. At the end of August and early September we typically count over 500 Chimney Swifts. The event is sponsored by Houston Audubon Society, the Nature Discovery Center, and Whole Foods Market.

Waterfowl Numbers Increase

The preliminary estimate of total ducks from the 2009 Waterfowl Breeding Population and Habitat Survey was 42 million, which is 13 percent greater than last year's estimate and 25 percent greater than the 1955-2008 average.

Overall, habitat conditions for breeding waterfowl in 2009 were better than conditions in 2008. Highlights from the survey in the north-central United States, south-central and northern Canada, and Alaska

(the traditional survey area) include:

- The estimated mallard population is 8.5 million birds, a 10 percent increase over last year's estimate of 7.7 million birds and 13 percent above the long-term average.
- The estimated population of 3.1 million Gadwall is similar to last year's estimate and 73 percent above the long-term average.
- At 7.4 million, the estimated population size of Blue-winged Teal is the second highest on record, while Green-winged Teal numbers were at an all-time high of 3.4 million. Estimates for both species are well above their long-term averages (60 percent and 79 percent, respectively).

- The 3.2 million estimate for Northern Pintails is 23 percent more than last year but 20 percent below the long-term average.
- The estimated number of one million Redheads is similar to last year and is 62 percent above the long-term average.
- The Canvasback estimate of 662,000 is 35 percent more than last year's estimate and similar to the long-term average.
- The estimated abundance of Northern Shovelers (4.4 million) is 25 percent more than last year and 92 percent above the long-term average.
- The Scaup (Lesser and Greater combined), estimate of 4.2 million, is 12 percent greater than last year but 18 percent below the long-term average.
