Program: Birding Namibia with Dr. Richard Peake

Have you seen the huge dunes along the southwestern coast of Africa? Visit some of the most remarkable landscapes of the world and see birds that have adapted to this harsh climate. Dick Peake will give a slide-illustrated talk about a trip through Namibia during the year 2000, plus a pelagic birding trip from Capetown. For this trip, the Namibia portion was led by the renowned guide Terry Stevenson, the South African extension by the equally famous Ian Sinclair. See birds and animals of the Etosha Pan, a panorama of wildlife as interesting as any to be seen in East Africa.

Dick Peake has been a birder for over 60 years and sports a life list over 5500 species. He has birded many African venues including Ethiopia, Uganda, Kenya, Gabon, and Sierra Leone and has an African list exceeding 1300 species.

Dick began his birding early in Chesapeake, Virginia. When he was 11 years old, his fifth grade teacher started a junior Audubon Club in her class. Two years later, Peake persuaded his parents to buy him a pair of WWII army surplus 6x30 binoculars. Imagine his excitement when one of the first birds he found in his neighborhood was a Western Kingbird. At the University of Virginia, Dick and his roommate Renwick Kerr spent more time birding than studying for classes. While attending Old Dominion University for a semester, Dick made his first significant contribution to Virginia ornithology by finding a group of Lincoln's Sparrows wintering in Tidewater Virginia. After taking a Ph.D. in English at the University of Georgia, he became Chair of the Department of English at the University of Virginia's College at Wise, Virginia, a post that he held for thirty years. During that time he was active in the Virginia Society of Ornithology and served as a member of its governing board, its records committee, and its President. After retirement in 1998 he began spending much of his time in Texas, specifically Galveston. He became co-compiler of the Freeport Christmas Bird Count, a post he has just relinquished.

- 1. Learning Corner: Pam Smolen discussed "Common Birds." Pam suggested spending time in local areas to observe birds' behaviors and habits. Areas she suggested include Pine Brook Wetlands and Armand Bayou. Pam recommended the website of Cornell Lab of Ornithology and their "All About Birds" site for bird information. Birds we see all the time can be interesting to watch for their behaviors. She mentioned that American Crows are ground feeders, eating earthworms, insects and other small animals; they live about 15 years and live in the same roost sites. Blue Javs have tight family bonds but have no distinctive patterns for migrating. Robins have 3 different broods a year; their diet consists of earthworms in the morning but they often switch to fruit later in the day. Other birds of interest are Carolina Chickadees, which mingle with other species during migration; Yellow-rumped Warblers, which can eat insects off the surface of water; and Cedar Waxwings, whose diet consists of fruit for several months.
- 2. Sightings: Recent bird sightings include: Townsend's Warbler, Rufous Hummingbird, Couch's Kingbird; Tree and Barn Swallows and Purple Martins at Katy Prairie; Western Kingbird at Cedar Hill Park; a pair of Red-headed Woodpeckers at Bear Creek Park; and at El Franco Lee Park a Harris's Hawk, Screech Owl and Vermilion Flycatcher.
- **3. Minutes:** Minutes from the February 1, 2010 meeting were approved as printed in *The Spoonbill*.
- **4. Treasurer's Report:** Jerry Stanislav reported that the OG balance is \$10,091.00, up from last month, and will increase as more membership dues are paid.
- **5.** *Spoonbill:* Al Shultz informed members that *The Spoonbill* was mailed late this month but will be arriving by mail shortly. Items for the April issue are due by March 15th.
- **6. Membership:** Margret Simmons has a few extra ONC year books for the 2009-2010 year if anyone

- 7. Announcements: Pam Smolen reminded members of the lecture by Dr. Douglas Tallamy on Wednesday, March 31, 2010 at Rice University. A \$5 parking fee can be paid by debit or credit card. Pam announced that the Chimney Swifts were starting to arrive in our area.
- 8. **Past Field Trips:** Adam Wood reported on the San Antonio Quarterly field trip, stating that 14 people attended and 121 species were observed, including Cinnamon Teal, Bank Swallow, Green-tailed Towhee and Greater Scaup. On the Katy Prairie field trip, 16 people attended, observing 87 Species including Western Meadowlark, Canvasback and Harris's Sparrow. Kevin Poling will be taking over for Adam as Field Trip Coordinator.
- 9. Upcoming Field Trips: This month's field trip will be on Saturday, March 20, 2010 to Sheldon Lake State Park. Meeting time is 8:00 a.m. at the Environmental Learning Center Parking Lot. The Spring Quarterly Field Trip will be April 29 to May 2 to the Lower Rio Grande Valley and King Ranch. Contact Adam Wood and the OG website for more details. The quarterly trip has 12 openings.
- 10. **Program:** John Schneider introduced Steve Matherly who presented the program, "The Diverse

Birdlife of Goa, India." Steve shared his photos from his November 2006 trip to Goa, featuring the different habitats and diverse bird life in the area. During his two week stay, Steve observed approximately 300 species. On the hotel grounds, Steve was able to photograph the Common Flameback, Coppersmith Barbet and Rufous Treepie among others. At the beaches and flats area, Brownheaded Gulls and Lesser Sand-plover were spotted. Indian Pond-heron, Marsh Sandpiper, Common Greenshank and Greater Painted-snipe were seen at the wetlands, paddy fields. At the mangroves, Steve took photos of Grey Heron, Little Egret and Common, Black-capped and Collared Kingfishers. The grassy fields had Red-whiskered and Redvented Bulbul, and Pallid Harrier and Brahminy Kites. The Bondla Forest Preserve fruit trees provided figs for such birds as the Asian Koel, Malabar Trogan and Malabar Barbet. For more information, Steve's website is: www.ImpressionsofNature.com

The Story behind Bicknell's Thrush

Bicknell's Thrush reminds us how we are constantly learning more about birds. This thrush did not become its own species until 1995. Bicknell's Thrush was first discovered in 1881 by 21 year old amateur ornithologist Eugene P. Bicknell. Bicknell and a local guide were at the summit of Slide Mountain in the Catskills near New York City when Bicknell heard singing Swainson's Thrushes and what sounded like a Veery. He collected the thrush and tentatively identified it as a Gray-cheeked Thrush.

Bicknell sent the specimen to Dr. Robert Ridgway at the American Museum of Natural History. Ridgway determined that the bird was a new subspecies of the Gray-cheeked Thrush and gave it the name Bicknell's Thrush. Bicknell surprised the ornithological community with this startling discovery of an unknown thrush just outside of America's largest metropolitan area in the backyard of many great ornithologists.

Ornithologists studied Bicknell's Thrush in the 1930's and again in the early 1990's. They found that Bicknell's Thrush was considerably smaller than Gray-cheeked Thrush with some coloration differences. They also found that the known breeding and winter ranges did not appear to overlap between the two thrushes. There were significant differences in the calls and songs of the two birds. The recent studies included an examination of the DNA of both thrushes. DNA studies showed a significant divergence between the thrushes and indicated that they separated from a common ancestor about one million years ago.

In 1995 the American Ornithological Union's Committee on Classification and Nomenclature examined all of the available evidence and gave Bicknell's Thrush full species status with the scientific name Catharus bicknelli.

April 17, 2010 -- Field Trip to Matagorda County

Matagorda County Birding Nature Center, 8 a.m.

This year's spring migration trip will be to Matagorda County and the Matagorda County Birding Nature Center. This trip will give us a chance to compare spring migration to what we saw during the fall migration at this location. During the trip we will visit most of the birding hot spots in Matagorda County. Our main targets will be the neotropical migrant passerines, especially warblers (i.e. Golden-winged Warbler, Cape May Warbler, Cerulean Warbler, Swainson's Warbler, and Mourning Warbler) but we will also spend some time birding the beach for non-passerine migrants like sandpipers (i.e. Whimbrel, Red Knot, Baird's Sandpiper, and Buff-breasted Sandpiper) and lingering winter species such as ducks (i.e. Cinnamon Teal, Greater Scaup, Canvasback, Redhead, Hooded Merganser, Common Goldeneye, and Bufflehead) and geese..

This trip should be a great one where we will hope to encounter a fallout if weather conditions work out right for us. Even without a fallout we could find 25+ species of warblers including some of the more western warblers like McGillivray's. This trip will also be a good opportunity for those birders who are participating in the Century Club to work on their Matagorda County lists. Remember that we want it to rain in the late morning or early afternoon if we want a chance to witness a fallout. So if it looks like it is going to rain during the day, that is what we are looking for, so don't let it scare you. Come out and join us for what could be a magical afternoon of birding.

Directions: We will meet at the <u>Matagorda County Birding Nature Center</u> at 8 a.m. The nature center is 1.7 miles west of Bay City on SH 35. If you wish to carpool from Houston, I will be at the Katy Prairie Conservancy Headquarters at 3015 Richmond Avenue at 5:30 and will leave by 6:00 a.m. Please call me and let me know to expect you if you are planning on carpooling. This will be an all-day trip and the best passerine birding usually occurs in the afternoon especially if we have fallout conditions.

Be sure to bring: binoculars, hat, sunscreen, water, a lunch, spotting scope, camera, rain gear in case it rains, and snacks.

April 29 - May 2, 2010

Quarterly Field Trip -- Lower Rio Grande Valley including King Ranch

Our spring quarterly trip will be to the Lower Rio Grande Valley and will include a possible full day tour of the King Ranch on April 29 – May 2, 2010. We will have several guides during the weekend. If we tour the King Ranch, Jim Sinclair and Tom Langshield will be our guides for the day. Dan Jones or Roy Rodriguez will be our guides to the best birding locations that Hidalgo County has to offer and Scarlet Colley will be our guide on Sunday on our boat trip out to see the Mangrove Warbler (weather permitting). During the trip we will of course try to make attempts at any "mega-rarities" that we catch word of. The current itinerary for this trip if contingent on guide availability and weather so the final itinerary maybe quite different. For now the itinerary is:

Stay in Weslaco on Thursday, April 29.

April 30: We will bird locations like Bentsen State Park, Estero Llano Grande, Santa Ana NWR, and Anzalduas County Park. (Dan Jones and/or Roy Rodriguez)

Stay in **Kingsville** on Friday, April 30.

May 1: Full day birding tour on the King Ranch; stay in Weslaco.

May 2: Take a two to three hour boat tour; return to Houston.

You will not want to miss this trip as it should be a great one. More details will be posted on the OG website as they become available. If you are interested in this trip, please let me know and I will get your name on the list and get more details to you when I get them.

<u>Be sure to bring</u>: Binoculars, a warm coat or jacket in case it is cold, rain gear in case it rains, hat, sun block, camera, spotting scope, \$20 for admission fees and \$20 dollar donation to the OG, you can bring extra money for a tip for the guides if you wish, and water.

(Very Rare), Ladder-backed Woodpecker (Very Rare), Western Kingbird (Very Rare), Rock Wren (one previous record for the UTC, 1974), Tennessee Warbler (no previous records for the month), Western Tanager (Very Rare) and Baltimore Oriole (Very Rare). This is a listing of species reported and not all of these reports have been validated and reviewed. For ease of editing, domestic and exotic species reported were left in.
