Program: Nesting Birds of America's Prairie Grasslands

Greg Lasley first pointed a camera at a bird in 1971, a Horned Lark at Great Salt Lake, Utah, while he was in the U.S. Air Force. By 1976, as a novice but enthusiastic bird-watcher, he became interested in documenting rare birds, and from the late 1970s until the late 1980s most of Greg's wildlife photography focused on documenting rarities and obtaining slides of birds to illustrate his lectures for Audubon chapters and other nature groups. In 1983 he became Texas co-editor of American Birds, now known as North American Birds, a publication of the American Birding Association. Greg continued in that role through 2000 and was Secretary of the Texas Bird Records Committee from 1986 to 2000. He also served on the Bird Records Committee of the ABA for two terms, until 2005.

After 1988, Greg became more serious about photography, and his photo credits now exceed 2,000 published images in more than 100 different books and magazines, such as Texas Highways Magazine, Texas Parks and Wildlife Magazine, American Birds, and Wildlife Conservation.

In 2000, Greg and his friend and fellow photographer Larry Ditto jointly won the prestigious Valley Land Fund Wildlife Photo Contest, and in 2002 they took third place.

Greg's <u>photography</u> continues to branch out into new subjects. Dragonflies and damselflies have been a favorite subject for him in recent years; however, birds are still a prime focus.

Greg spent 25 years in law enforcement, retiring from the Austin Police Department in 1997 as a lieutenant. From 1997 through early 2005 he divided his time between photographing wildlife and leading bird-watching trips over much of the western hemisphere for Victor Emanuel Nature Tours; he had also led trips for VENT part-time from 1985 to 1997. In March 2005 Greg decided to take a sabbatical from regular tour leading. He now concentrates on photography and other wildlife pursuits, and still leads occasional trips for VENT. He and his wife, Cheryl Johnson, reside in Austin, Texas.

Minutes of Meeting Monday, November 1, 2010 Bayland Community Center Number of Attendees: 44

- **1. Learning Corner:** Sumita Prasad discussed tips on distinguishing Hummingbirds. In her presentation she compared Ruby-throated to Black-chinned, and also the Selasphorus Rufous, Allen's and Broadtailed. Differences between the Ruby-throated and the Black-chinned include: smaller bill and a longer tail on the Ruby-throated, and an angular wing on the Ruby-throated compared to a paddle-shaped wing with rounded primaries on the Black-chinned. While feeding, the Black-chinned pumps his tail, but the Ruby-throated does not pump as much. The crown colors are emerald green for the Ruby-throated and grayish for the Black-chinned. The Rufous and Allen's are very similar and have rounded heads. The Broad-tailed's head is a little bit cone-shaped. When comparing the three, look at key features, but the tail feathers if separated out are a great indicator. The Rufous has a notched tail; the Allen's has a pointed tail with no notch and the Broad-tailed has rounded tail feathers.
- 2. Sightings: Birds recently sighted include: Winter Wren at Clear Lake; Nashville Warbler, Mourning Warbler, Black-throated Blue Warbler; Red-breasted Nuthatch. In Galveston: orioles, Indigo Buntings, Franklin's Gull, Common Terns, Western Tanagers and Golden-crowned Kinglets. At Sabine Woods: Barn Owls. A Gray Catbird was seen in a member's yard.
- **3. Minutes:** Minutes from the October 4, 2010 meeting were approved as printed in the November issue of *The Spoonbill*.
- 4. *The Spoonbill:* All articles for the December issue are due by November 15. Al Shultz has requested any information on the CBCs to be sent to him to be added to the next issue.
- 5. **Membership:** Margret Simmons reminded everyone to please sign in. Margret also mentioned that she has extra copies of the ONC Yearbook if someone had not received a copy.
- 6. **Library Report:** Deborah Valdez reported the Library has 2 field guides on Hummingbirds and also a DVD available. *A Guide to Hawks From Every Angle*, by Jerry Liguori, has been purchased for the Library. Deborah asked if members were interested in purchasing older books that OG no longer uses. Please contact Deborah if you are interested.

7. Treasurer's Report: Jerry Stanislav reported that the OG balance is \$10,084.76. Jerry mentioned that the OG is saving money by using HISD for printing. Jerry will have a more detailed budget at the December meeting.

8. Announcements:

- (a) Pam Smolen has received a request from the GCBO for a donation for the Smith Point Hawk Watch. The OG has \$400.00 budgeted yearly for donations. The OG Board has recommended a \$200.00 donation be given. Because costs in printing *The Spoonbill* are less this year, the OG would be able to give the donation. A vote approved the donation.
- (b) Houston Audubon Society is collecting donations for the Nash Prairie. Anyone wishing to make a donation should send a check to HAS with a notation in the check's memo line to Nash Prairie.
- (c) Pam announced that seven board positions will be available for next year including Membership Secretary, *Spoonbill* Editor, and Chair. If anyone is interested in volunteering for a position, please contact Pam. John Schneider announced that he will be unable to be on the slate for Chair and will answer any questions regarding the positions.
- (d) Bob Honig discussed the progress of the Matt Cook Memorial Wildlife Viewing Platform at Warren Lake. The parking lot has been built and the structure is pretty much completed. There is a trail with new native plantings leading to the platform. It is expected to be open for daylight hours in December. Bob will have a more firm date at the December meeting.

- **9. Past Field Trips:** Adam Wood reported on the Quarterly field trip in the Austin area. Around 102 birds were seen. Highlights included an Ash-throated flycatcher and wild Mallards flying overhead.
- 10. Future Field Trips: November's Field Trip will be to Bolivar. Meeting time is 8:00 a.m. at the ferry parking lot on Bolivar. A beach parking pass is needed and can be purchased at gas stations on Bolivar or at Fort Travis's office. The permit is \$10.00 and good until the end of this calendar year. Adam announced the Winter Quarterly trip will be in northeast Texas, Throckmorton to Fort Worth, January 27-30. Fourteen or fifteen people may attend. Please contact Adam for information and he will add you to the list.
- **11. Program:** John Schneider introduced Sumita Prasad, the southwest regional manager for the

Wildlife Habitat Council. She is a licensed bird-bander and specializes in hummingbirds. Sumita presented the program "Hummingbirds of Houston and Southwest Texas". She offered some interesting facts on hummingbirds: they can fly at a speed of 50 mph, and their wings beat 60-80 times per second. While resting their heart beats 250 times a minute and 1,250 times per minute in flight. Their feathers have iridescent colors. Young hummingbirds have buffy colored tips on their crown feathers; they need to be a year old to get their adult plumage and distinctive gorget colors. The young also have rough bills that smooth out from wear as they get older. Hummingbirds migrate great distances and banding helps monitor their patterns.

Pioneer Naturalists

This month is a continuation of the story of the pioneer naturalists of the US-Mexico Border Survey (1848-1855). Darius Nash Couch and Charles Wright are the subjects of this month's article.

Darius Nash Couch was a West Point graduate and Mexican War participant. In 1853 he took a year's leave of absence to make a zoological expedition into Mexico loosely attached to the Border Survey. As a result of his trip into Mexico, Couch described a junco, Scott's Oriole, and the Chihuahuan Raven. The raven was a completely new species. The name Scott's Oriole derived from Couch's proposed scientific name, Icterus scottii. Couch named the oriole as a token of his high regard for Major General Winfield Scott, Commander in Chief of the U.S. Army. Unknown to Couch, the oriole had already been described by Charles Bonaparte who gave it the scientific name *Icterus parisorum*. Baird described the Couch's Kingbird after a specimen that Couch collected in Mexico.

Couch went on to become a Union general during the Civil War, and fought at Chancellorsville and Gettysburg. After the Civil War, Couch did not continue with his interest in birds. He held several different jobs, including quartermaster-general and adjutant-general of Connecticut.

Charles Wright was one of the best and most successful of the nineteenth-century American plant

hunters. Most of his collecting was done in Texas, New Mexico, Arizona, and Cuba. He also spent three years attached to the Rodgers and Ringgold Pacific Exploring Expedition. Wright is described as an eccentric who preferred exploring more than anything else

After graduating from Yale, Wright traveled to Mississippi to become a tutor for a plantation owner's family. He then traveled to Texas where he worked as a teacher and land surveyor. During this time he started collecting plants for Asa Gray. In 1849 he joined an army expedition in Texas, botanizing from Galveston to San Antonio and then on to El Paso. In the spring of 1851 he joined the United States and Mexican Boundary Survey. His collections from these two trips form the basis of Gray's *Plantae Wrightianae* (1852-53). While Wright's primary interest was plants, records show that he collected a surprisingly large quantity of birds.

Charles Wright is commemorated in the names of several plants and Gray Flycatcher, *Empidonax wrightii*, by Baird. The name Wright's Flycatcher, though derived from this scientific name, was used erroneously for many years for the Dusky Flycatcher.

December Field Trip: Houston CBC December 18, 2010

The holiday season is upon us once again and you know what that means --it is time for another fun and exciting round of Christmas Bird Counts. The December field trip will be the annual Houston Christmas Bird Count that is sponsored by the Houston Ornithology Group. This year's count will be held on the 18th of December.

The count circle is centered in Baytown and extends south to La Porte and Morgan's Point, west to San Jacinto Monument and Lynchburg, north to Highlands and Mont Belvieu, and east to Beach City. The count compiler is David Sarkozi (<u>david@sarkozi.net</u>, 713-412-4409) who can be contacted for area assignments and meeting times unless you are already in touch with an area leader.

We strongly encourage you to participate in the Christmas Bird Count even if it is only watching your feeder in your back yard. This is a chance for all us to practice citizen science and contribute valuable information to the scientific community that will help in tracking population changes in bird species. The information gathered during the counts will also help monitor how bird species and populations are doing year to year, and to find out if any are declining significantly. The more eyes we have out there, the less chance for a bird to go by unnoticed. We also encourage everyone to participate in other Christmas Bird Counts besides Houston's.

Winter Quarterly Trip: Wichita Falls and surroundings January 27 - 30, 2011

Our winter quarterly trip this year will be to Wichita Falls and surroundings (Wilbarger, Throckmorton, and Archer Counties). This trip will be an opportunity for us to bird off the beaten path in one of the more under-birded areas of the state due to its relative remoteness and lack of birding hotspots. But don't let the fact that this area gets scant birding coverage fool you. This area has had a habit of producing some really good rarities over the last several winters, most notably raptors. This could be the case again this year, especially if scientists' prediction of a major vole crash in the north comes to fruition causing the northern raptors to come further south in search of prey then they typically do. With that in mind this trip will be more of a target orientated trip than what we have done in the past. We will mostly be working on tracking down some of the harder to find winter species in Texas like the rarer grebes (Red-necked), ducks (Eurasian Wigeon, Long-tailed, and Common Merganser), raptors (Golden Eagle, Rough-legged Hawk, Ferruginous Hawk, and Prairie Falcon), and sparrows (especially the Longspurs (Smith's, Lapland, and Chestnut-colored), and maybe even an American Tree Sparrow). We of course will not ignore the more common species around while we are searching for the rarities that have a history of showing up in this area. Under these circumstances who knows what goodies we could encounter. A Northern Goshawk could be out there waiting for us to find it.

This trip will also be a good opportunity for any of you who are county listers since we will be spending a good amount of time in Wilbarger, Archer and Throckmorton Counties during this trip. We will not be specifically working on building large county lists for those counties but it will be an opportunity to get a good start in those further a field and under birded counties. This trip unlike previous trips will give us an opportunity to bird some off the beaten path locations in a vastly different landscape then what we are use to along the coastal plains on the UTC for a bit of a change of pace. This should be a great trip with memorable experiences in some relatively unknown locations that you will not want to miss.

We are still working on arranging a leader(s) and accommodations for this trip. As for the accommodations we will be staying in Wichita Falls. Look for further information on the OG website as we get it and further details will be in the January Spoonbill. Again like all other quarterly trips this trip will be limited to the first 14 members that sign up. If you are interested in this trip please let me know and I will get your name on the list and get more details to you when I have them.
